**Report of the International Webinar on  
“Learning Environment for the 21<sup>st</sup> Century: Issues and Challenges”**

A two day International Webinar titled ‘Learning environment For the 21<sup>st</sup> Century: Issues and Challenges’ was organized by the Department of Education in Collaboration with the IQAC of Bamanpukur Humayun Kabir Mahavidyalaya sponsored by ICSSR-ERC, Kolkata on 26<sup>th</sup> and 27<sup>th</sup> September, 2020.

**Day- 1. 26<sup>th</sup> September, 2020**

Prof. Sumita Chatterjee, Assistant Professor and Head of Department of Education, BHKM began the proceedings by welcoming the speakers before handing it over to Prof. Ashis Biswas, Assistant Professor and Department of English, BHKM who invited the Dr. Subhash Biswas, Principal, BHKM to deliver the inaugural speech. Following Dr. Subhash Biswas’s speech Prof. Ashis Biswas introduced the keynote speaker Dr. Marmar Mukhopadhyay.

The first two speakers of Day 1 were Dr. Marmar Mukhopadhyay, Chairman Educational Technology and Management Association (ETMA) and Dr. Rekha B. Koul, Dean Faculty of Humanities and Associate Professor, School of Education, Curtin University, Perth Australia.

Dr. Marmar Mukhopadhyay began his lecture by noting that the topic under discussion, namely, Learning environment in the 21<sup>st</sup> Century was an extensively written and discussed theme since 1990s. Next he elaborated on the 10 attributes of 21<sup>st</sup> Century Learning, like learner-centred self-learning, online learning, hands-on learning, opportunities for creative expressions and problem solving among others. He stressed on the fact that 21<sup>st</sup> century learners were smarter learners who could decide what and how they want to learn. Dr. Mukhopadhyay highlighted on the new technologies and tools of learning including online education, artificial intelligence, game-based learning, adaptive computer testing, cloud computing and micro credentials. Next, the lecture geared towards discussing the digital divide which persists in our nation. The discussion ended by elaborating on the 5W model of learning.

Dr. Rekha B. Koul commenced with providing the historical background of learning environments before meandering to harping the central issue that each learning environment has its own specificities and necessities. She commented that online learning in even in her university was hardly a help for lab-based courses like journalism and mass media where students need to go to society to learn. She shared pictures of her classrooms with voice activated cameras and disintegrable furniture where learning has been online for the past seven years. She discussed on pedagogical shifts in learning from cognitive to constructivist to virtual approaches and on 21<sup>st</sup> century learning skills including critical thinking, creativity, collaboration and communication. Dr. Koul reiterated that it was important for today’s teacher to become an action researcher and for that a major paradigm shift in perceiving education, catering to diversity in society, equity and social justice, peer learning were essential prerequisites. She also explained about certain methods like flipped classroom and digital tools that can be used in classroom teaching before concluding on the note that self-actualisation is the aim of education.

Mr. Shiv Narayan Verma, Faculty, Department of English, BHKM introduced the next speaker of the day's session, Dr. Nimai Chand Maiti. Dr. Maiti is a Former Professor, Department of Education, University of Calcutta.

Prof. Maiti spoke on the issue of 21<sup>st</sup> century Learning Environment. At the very outset he emphasized upon the role of teachers in producing efficient learning environments. He also mentioned about the New Education Policy 2020 which deals with a focus on learning environments and usage of different tools to ensure better learning outcomes. He then went on to suggest that the new age students are more advanced in terms of their technological handlings. He suggested that any particular learning environment deals with a range of elements. There is diversity in each learning environment. Also learning environments are context-specific in their nature highlighted Prof. Maiti in his speech.

Prof. Maiti argued that essentially there are four different kinds of visible learning environments. They are, namely, learner/student oriented, Teacher/knowledge oriented, Assessment-based and Community oriented. The speaker contended that the rapport between the teacher and student is extremely significant in establishing efficient learning environments. A teacher plays an instrumental role in making the learning environment comfortable for the student, suggested the speaker. Hence, he stated that asking question, making mistakes, taking interest in the students' struggles and the likes helps in fostering a better climate for student-teacher interaction. It is also equally significant to celebrate and reward the students' achievements.

Therefore, the speech of Prof. Maiti served to enlighten the participants on various issues pertaining to creating better learning environments. His lecture was followed by a formal Q&A session.

The next speaker, Dr. Rena Nanda was introduced by Mr. Rejaul Molla, a faculty member at the Department of English, Bamanpukur Hmayun Kabir Mahavidyalaya. Prof. Renu Nanda is the Dean and Professor at the Department of Education, University of Jammu.

Prof. Nanda taking a cue from the previous speakers of the day went on to further delve deeper into the several significant areas covering the issue of learning environments. She stated that it is important to initiate special tasks and then follow up on them in creating better learning environments. Within this context, she implied that many a time teachers begin with a task of engaging the community in fostering learning environments and in such cases they need to follow up further to make things work. She emphasized that teaching-learning is a two way process. Time tables while mandatory in teaching curriculum should be made flexible as per the needs and accessibility of the students.

Prof. Renu Nanda suggested that despite several past policies in education the outcomes have not been achieved due to gap in the implementation process. It is important to make students problem solvers according to her. She spoke of the process of blended learning which is significant for this new age and era.

She went on to suggest the positive aspects that the NEP attempts to project would be helpful in creating room for better learning environment. She emphasized that it is important to bridge the gap between school education and higher education. Experiential learning must be made part of school education to help students grasp the knowledge imparted to them in higher educational institutions. Prof. Nanda suggested that the teacher plays multiple roles and should also encourage peer learning among students. The teacher must do the hand-holding and allow students to chart out ways so that they realize the objectives of any teaching course.

The lecture was followed by a formal Q&A session. The chairman of the National Webinar, Dr, Subhash Biswas, Principal, BHKM summed up the speeches of the four respective speakers in

the first day of the webinar. This was followed by a formal vote of thanks by the convenor of this ICSSR-ERC sponsored webinar, Mr. Arghadip Paul a faculty at the Department of Education, BHKM.

### Day – 2. 27<sup>th</sup> September, 2020

The 2<sup>nd</sup> Day of the Programme was about the Paper Presentation Session. Total 50 Faculties and Research Scholars from various part of the Country presented their research findings. There are two parallel sessions for paper presentation. One is Chaired by Dr. Indrani Nath, Associate Professor, Department of Education, Sharsuhna College and the other is chaired by Dr. Shrabanti Mukhopadhyay, Assistant Professor, Department of Education, Gokhele Memorial College.

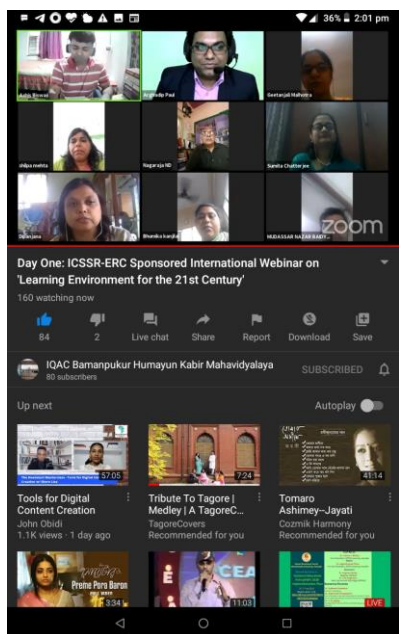
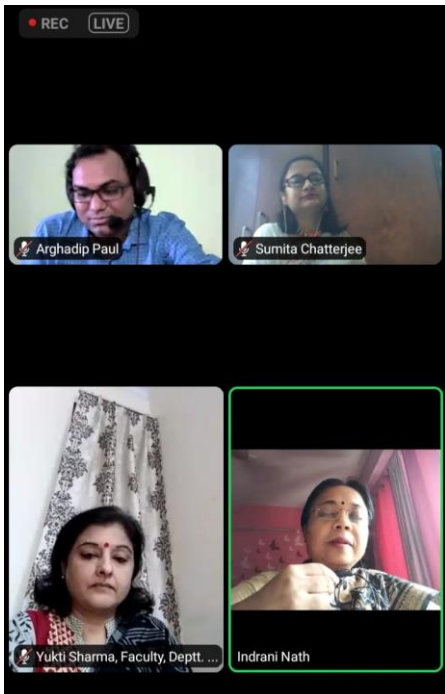

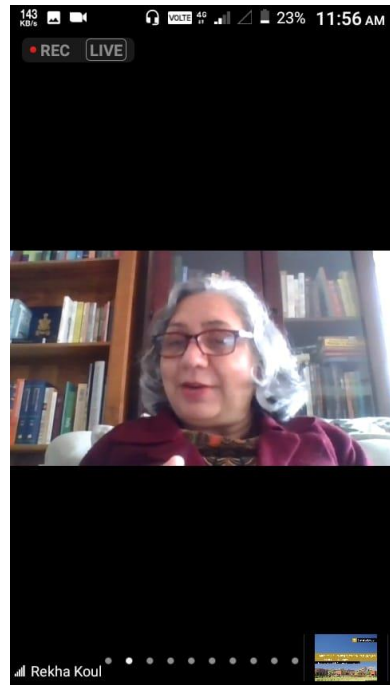
