

Introduction to the event

Activity Report

Welcome address by Sri Arup Kr Banerjee:

The programme was started by the Welcome Speech delivered by departmental teacher Sri Arup Kr Banerjee. At the onset of the programme Sri Banerjee, welcome all the students and teachers.
